## Good News! Celebrate!

Dear Members and Friends of Hope Lutheran Church,

Greetings in the Name of our crucified and risen Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ!

There are several things on my mind as I compose this article. The first is a reminder of the balance of our Lent and Easter worship service schedule.

We still have two Wednesday Lenten services in April: April 2 and April 9, both at 6:30 p.m., with a time for food and fellowship at 5:30 p.m. prior to the services. We will be concluding our Lenten theme: “The Hills of Lent.” The last of this series will be on Good Friday, April 18, at 6:30 p.m. (There will be an additional service on Good Friday at 1:00 p.m.)

As is our custom, we will observe our Lord’s institution of His Holy Supper on Maundy Thursday, April 17, at 6:30 p.m. Holy Communion will be celebrated.

Our Administrative Board has set a schedule for Easter Sunday morning with two services: one at 9:00 a.m. and the other at 11:00 a.m. An Easter Breakfast will be offered in the Fellowship Hall from 10:00 until 11:15 a.m. The 9:00 a.m. service will feature hymns and songs with organ accompaniment and the 11:00 a.m. service will feature hymns and songs selected by *envoy*, our music team.

Please look forward to your fellow church members contacting you by phone with a reminder of our Holy Week schedule, an encouragement to attend as you are able, and to make note of any prayer requests you may have that you would like to be mentioned in our public prayers!

The second item of interest is very exciting for us as a congregation and for our sister congregation – St. Matthew’s Lutheran Church in Adrina. With the guidance and blessing of our Michigan District, we look forward to the MERGING of our two congregations! This is a work in progress, probably taking a few months to complete. In the meantime, we welcome our brothers and sisters in Christ from St. Matthew’s to join us in worship and fellowship. God’s Mission and Ministry to and through us as His people will increase and grow as a result of this merger!

Lastly, I would like to comment briefly on the oft-repeated theme of our new Administration in Washington: “Make America Great Again.” Even though we may or may not agree with the tone, policies, or focus of this new administration, I cannot imagine why any American citizen of any political persuasion would not want the best for our great country – America!

I was listening recently to a CD presentation on the American Presidents from Washington to the first Trump administration. Each administration throughout our history has had accomplishments to be proud of and failures/scandals to regret. However, *in every generation since our founding, the people of the world have wanted to come to America and stay here!* That’s saying a lot about our nation. I remember the words from President John F. Kennedy’s inaugural address: “I do not believe that any of us would exchange places with any other people [of the world] or any other generation.” To which I add my hearty “Amen!”

However, I believe that we Christians in this nation understand, that, before America can be made great again, the Church must be great again through the influence and proclamation of God’s Law and Gospel! As the prophet Joel exhorted God’s people, we, too, must “return to the LORD” our God! I close with a comment of two English ministers who traveled the United States back in the 1830s: “America will be great if America is good. If not, her greatness will vanish away like a morning cloud.”

## Stewardship Corner

### Having the Right Priorities

What are your top priorities in life? To whom or to what do you give the most time and attention? Jesus said, *“For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also”* (Matthew 6:21). Where we prioritize our time and money will reveal our most important priorities and the condition of our hearts.

By God’s grace, we see that the priorities the world promotes contrast with God’ priorities. The world’s focus is on self-promotion, power, and the accumulation of an abundance of possessions. Success is of utmost importance. The world tells people that happiness and security are found only in having more stuff. The acquisition of things demands a person’s time, attention, and money to obtain and maintain.

God’s Word does not condemn material wealth, but it does provide a warning that the riches of this world will not provide long-lasting peace, contentment, security, joy, or hope. In Luke’s Gospel, Jesus said, *“For what good does it profit a man if he gains the whole world and loses or forfeits himself?”* (9:25).

Scripture provides numerous examples of people who had the wrong priorities. An example of having wrong priorities with time is the story of Mary and Martha. In Luke 10:40, we read, *“But Martha was distracted with much serving.”* Mary and Martha were hosting Jesus. Martha became so preoccupied with preparing food and serving that she was distracted from the opportunity simply to sit and listen to Jesus’ teaching. Mary *“chose the good portion”*; she sat at Jesus’ feet to learn from Him. This highlights the importance of prioritizing spiritual growth and connection over mere physical acts of serving.

An example of having a wrong priority with money is the parable of the Rich Fool. The Rich Fool wanted to build bigger barns to store his crops. His goal was to *“eat, drink, be merry”* (Luke 12:19). Jesus called him a fool because he gave no credit to God for his success, nor did he show any interest for the welfare of others. He lived only for himself. In this parable, Jesus said, *“Take care, and be on your guard against all covetousness, for one’s life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions”* (Luke 12:15).

Jesus directs us to *“...seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you”* (Matthew 6:33). We are called to prioritize God’s will and purpose above everything else. With the faith that God gives us, we are enabled to distance ourselves from the attitude of the world that glorifies the earthly life and its possessions, and we can trust that God will provide for our needs.

## Joy in Tough Times

It's a tough season for my family. It's not the toughest it could be. We're all (mostly) healthy. We're not looking to move or leave our jobs anytime soon. We've settled into a rhythm of sorts. And yet, we feel a bit more strapped and stressed than ever. If I'm being honest, I want a roadmap out of the tough. Maybe you can relate to this feeling?

When we're feeling stretched thin, we often tend to forget to focus our family on Scripture. This is especially a problem when we're lacking in the joy department. Let's turn to four verses that help us remember where our joy is and what to do when we feel a lack of joy.

### Pray and Praise (James 5:13)

*Is anyone among you suffering? Let him pray. Is anyone cheerful? Let him sing praise.*

I love that this verse in James gives us permission to feel and then gives us specific instructions. It doesn't say, Find the person with the most suffering or the most joy and then act. God's Word is not commanding us to do that. It says *anyone*. It's easy to bypass our family's own stuff because it's not as bad or as good as someone else's. So what does Scripture say to do? Scripture tells us to pray and praise.

When things are difficult, remember God's promise to hear and answer every prayer. Sometimes though, it can be hard to pray for something that's bothering or antagonizing us. In the moment, we are not reminded of that piece of life. And the reverse is true too! It's sometimes hard to remember to bring praise to the Creator and Redeemer for little wins or good things. A tip I try to remember is to think through petitions and praise with the categories home, church, work, and world. What are my prayers in each of these places? What do I need to celebrate?

### Good and Bad (Romans 12:9)

*Let love be genuine. Abhor what is evil; hold fast to what is good.*

Again, this verse gives us a to-do list of sorts. There are two specific requests: (1) "abhor what is evil" and (2) "hold fast to what is good." But how do we do this? As theologians of the cross, we call

things what they are because of Jesus' suffering on the cross. We don't call Jesus' suffering and death good; we call it excruciating, painful, evil. It's His triumph over death and this suffering that is good. His death on the cross is not the good part of the story.

Name the things that aren't going well—the tough stuff—and own it. For my family, it seems as if there is never enough time. I hate that we are not able to connect as spouses in this season. It's hard that our girls don't sleep well.

Then, do the reverse: name the positives—the good stuff. We're blessed to have a church community we're so involved with. I'm fortunate to have a spouse who I miss when we're busy with jobs and parenting. It's good that our daughters know they can come to us when they're upset, sick, or scared.

We can hold fast to what is light, and we can treat the things that are bad as bad.

### In God's Hands (Ecclesiastes 7:14)

In the day of prosperity be joyful, and in the day of adversity consider: God has made the one as well as the other, so that man may not find out anything that will be after him.

If I were categorizing the books of the Bible into emotions, Ecclesiastes would be sadness. (Lamentations, Job, and Jeremiah would also be in this category.) I mean, the writer of Ecclesiastes, Solomon, starts the book by saying everything is meaningless. But even in this book, which tells us that everything we do is vanity, the Word reminds us that God's works are not. And God has crafted each millisecond. We can rest knowing that our God keeps His promises to work all for our good, wipe away every tear, and make all things new.

### Joyful Faith (1 Peter 1:8)

*Though you have not seen Him, you love Him. Though you do not now see Him, you believe in Him and rejoice with joy that is inexpressible and filled with glory.*

Through this verse, I am reminded of the incredible work of our Lord. That through time and

space, the God of the universe worked me into His salvation story. While I was meditating on this verse, I started thinking about my senses. I haven't seen Jesus, but I have received His true body and blood through the bread and wine I have tasted and touched. Through Communion, Jesus created a tactile way to meet His forgiveness. I believe in Jesus and can always find joy knowing that He meets me where He says He will.

## Mighty Mites at Work

Jesus tells us, “*And this Gospel of the kingdom will be proclaimed throughout the whole world as a testimony to all nations*” (Matthew 24:14a ESV). People who are blind or visually impaired, including those in prison, are in need of knowing Jesus as their Savior in a format and language they can read and understand.

Lutheran Braille Workers intentionally serves all people who are blind or visually impaired, including visually impaired prison inmates, with Bibles and other Christian materials in a format and language they can read, free of charge.

The Michigan District LWML, meeting in Grand Rapids in 2024, granted \$25,000.00 to enable Lutheran Braille Workers to use a prison Braille transcription program to transcribe new titles into Braille, and to purchase supplies and equipment for Michigan volunteers to produce and distribute Braille, Specialized Large Print, and Prison Large Print Christian materials, as well as Bible studies from Donna Snow, for people who are blind or visually impaired, primarily in Michigan, or around the world, so they might come to know Jesus as their Savior.
