# LORD, Help Us Live Fully in You

Dear Fellow Redeemed.

"We live in a culture that is increasingly secular. At its best, secularism is simply what we Americans call the separation of church and state. It is a practical way to keep people from having to live lives regimented by someone else's religious convictions and that keeps countries from being torn by conflicts between religious groups that all want to write the rules. There is a lot of history in our world that argues for the practicality of that kind of arrangement.

"As it has taken shape among us, however, secularism has a downside. We have come to a time when the legal structures of society are so intent upon not appearing to favor 'religion' over 'non-religion' that they appear to be in opposition to religion. In intellectual circles, the dominant belief that there are no absolutes has seemed to rule out the existence of God or of anything like 'the will of God.' In polite society, it is considered rude to talk about religion. Yet, many people seem to feel that it is appropriate to take every opportunity to ridicule religion and religious people. Now, we are given to understand that it is acceptable to have a religion, but we must keep it a very personal matter. That is to say, we may believe that there is a God, but we must live (publicly) as if He doesn't exist. In that atmosphere, faith tends to wither away.

"That has left a huge empty spot in the lives of many people and communities where something important ought to be. We rush ahead doing what seems profitable or pleasurable, with no source of moral restraint except the very pliable expectations of our culture. Many people experience a deep sense of emptiness that comes from living lives with no spiritual dimension. We may feel a deep sense of lostness and hopelessness that comes from not knowing about anyone except ourselves, and others like us, who can be counted on or trusted or looked to for help. I suspect that, at one time or another, every one of us has experienced at least some of this sense of being spiritually adrift.

"Most of us have been trained to live lives shaped by the values and expectations of our secular culture. The Apostle Paul called that 'living according to the flesh.' He contrasted it with another way of life that he called 'living by the Spirit.' Paul said that people who live by the flesh are very likely to fall into a life-shaping fear that will lead to death. Many of us know more about that than we want to. It is, to say the least, a life that lacks much of the joy and the excitement and the meaning and the purpose that we think should be part of a life that is real life.

"If we let God lead our lives, that will add a new dimension to our lives, a dimension that will give life new meaning and purpose. That experience can give you a sense of never being alone, and knowing that there is Someone at work who is greater than yourself adds a new dimension of possibility to life. Knowing God is at work can generate a new expectancy in us. It can encourage us to venture out beyond what we once thought was our 'comfort zone' to see what can happen. It can teach us a new way of being alive.

When things like that begin to happen in your life, you may discover what Paul meant when he talked about living according to the Spirit. It is living a life that is shaped by a faith relationship with God. Better yet, you may discover what it means to experience yourself as a child of God. That may satisfy a hunger you may not even have known you have.

### **Stewardship Corner**

#### Our "Journey on to Heaven"

For the past few generations, Martin Luther, who was a pastor, theologian, author, hymnwriter, and professor, has been and continues to be one of the most referenced or quoted spiritual leaders of all time. Luther was a prolific writer, so he has a wealth of articles, books, and essays to quote. The following amazing paragraph from Luther does not reference the word stewardship or steward, but it conveys foundational truths of Christian stewardship.

Therefore, we must use all these things upon earth in no other way than as a guest who travels through the land and comes to a hotel where he must lodge overnight. He takes only food and lodging from the host, and he says not that the property of the host belongs to him. Just so should we also treat our temporal possessions, as if they were not ours, and enjoy only so much of them as we need to nourish the body and then help our neighbors with the balance. Thus, the life of the Christian is only a lodging for the night, since we have here no continuing city, but must journey on to heaven, where the Father is.

Martin Luther aptly points out that, while on earth, we are God's guests. God is the creator, sustainer, and owner of all things. Both the food we eat and the homes we live in are provided by God. God makes it possible for us to plant food to eat, because He provides the seeds, ground, sunlight, and rain. He gives us the intelligence, strength, and energy to harvest the crops that He makes possible for us to plant. The meat we eat comes from the animals that live in the fields which God has provided along with the food He makes possible for them to eat. God also provides the materials for our homes. Our lives are in God's hands. As His stewards, we receive His blessings with thanksgiving.

Luther's perspective on temporal possessions is totally opposite of what our society promotes. Our society tells us that we create and have control over all we have. Our happiness and security are dependent upon having things. Our status is determined by what we have so we work long and hard to have big homes, new cars, and large investment accounts. In contrast, Luther reminds us that things, both necessities and luxuries, are God gifts on loan to us. Luther encourages us to be satisfied with enough to provide for our needs and to use the rest to support our neighbors and God's kingdom.

Luther reminds us that "the life of the Christian is only a lodging for the night." Likewise, the Apostle Paul tells us that "our citizenship is in heaven" (Philippians 3:20), so we "press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:14). Our earthly journey is merely temporary until we rest in our permanent home with Jesus. By God's grace, Luther knew that this life is a "journey on to heaven." We do as well.

In his letter to the Romans, Paul speaks of a deep yearning, a hunger, a hope that is there in the very life and body of the whole creation as it reaches out to come into relationship with God. 'We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now, and not only the creation but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies. For in hope, we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience' (Romans 8:22-25).

Are you feeling that yearning in your own life? Then learn to live expectantly. The God whom you hope to experience is real and alive and never far away."\*

A used trailer will help us to transport and store essential components of this ministry, including, but not limited to, a military tent, canned food, assortments of clothing, tables, and chairs in order to conduct a worship service for those who gather in the park.

The Michigan District LWML, meeting in Frankenmuth in July 2022, granted \$5,000.00 to enable the purchase of a used trailer to assist Family of God Lutheran Church with ministry to the homeless in Clark Park, Detroit.

Sharron has tentatively scheduled the Spring Rummage Sale for Thursday, April 18, and Friday, April 19. Bring your spring/summer items.




