## Why the Reformation Matters

Dear Fellow Lutherans and friends of the Gospel everywhere:

Wow! We are celebrating the 500<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Reformation with “the hammer heard round the world” as the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther nailed his 95 Theses (or statements for debate) to the castle church door in Wittenberg, Germany! (Meh. Only half a day from God’s perspective of earthly time! HA! (Look up 2 Peter 3:8) A lot of Christian religious history has occurred since then, but the basic principles of the Reformation still matter. They still matter (as they have mattered in every century) because they restate the essence of the doctrines / teachings in Holy Scripture regarding the desperateness of our fallen condition due to sin, the patience and persistence of God’s love toward us despite our sin and rebellion, and the Ultimate and Only Solution through God’s Only Begotten Son come to earth in the Person of Jesus Christ – by God’s grace through Faith alone we are blessed with the Gift of God – the Forgiveness of our sins, Life and Salvation! (And, as Luther noted, “wherever there is forgiveness of sins there also is life and salvation!”))

Vital issues of the Reformation involved determining answers to the following key questions: 1) What is the nature and source of authority in the Christian Church? 2) Is the grace of God something that is added to our lives to make us better or credited to us based upon the work of Jesus Christ? 3) What is the real significance and purpose of faith in the lives of individual Christians?

These questions are not simply matters for academic debate, they have to do with the correct understanding of Holy Scripture and its saving impact on our lives! In other words, how do we become God’s children while here on earth and how can we be sure of going to heaven when we leave this earth?

The answers to the three questions above are summarized in the following way: “Scripture alone;” “Grace alone;” “Faith alone.” Namely, the Bible or Holy Scripture is the only source and norm for Christian teaching and practice in the Church; the grace of God is imputed or credited to the Christians’ account by the completed, saving work of Jesus Christ on the Cross and in his victorious Resurrection from the dead; saving faith receives the free gift of salvation through trusting the Person and Work of Jesus Christ on our behalf. (Let us never forget that the Holy Spirit works faith in our hearts through God’s Word, specifically the Gospel, and the Sacraments of Holy Baptism and the Lord’s Supper.)

\*\*\* For those of you that would like more detail on this, please read the related article elsewhere in this Newsletter (page 4).

Another focus later in the Reformation included the understanding that we are saved through “Christ alone.” This might seem like a “no brainer” to us but it does reinforce the doctrine that the Bible knows of no other God besides the Holy Trinity and no Savior other than Jesus Christ. Nothing needs to be added to what He has done, indeed, nothing dare be added or taken away from His Finished Work on our behalf!

May the fruits of the Reformation continue to bless the Church and people around the world with our loving LORD’s eternal Word!

Soli Deo Gloria! To God Alone be the Glory!

# What Money Can't Buy

There's an old comedy routine where an armed robber walks up to Jack Benny, shoves a gun in his ribs and snarls, "Your money or your life!" There's a long pause. Jack Benny, who decades ago was a renowned comedian known for his thriftiness, does nothing. He says nothing. We can imagine Benny standing with his weight on one foot, holding his chin in one hand. The robber nudges him with the gun and impatiently asks: "Well?" Benny hesitates a moment longer, then says, "Don't rush me. I'm thinking! I'm thinking!"

That's how attached some of us are to money. Given a choice between our money or our lives, it's hard to decide. If a robber pointed a gun and asked for our wallets, we'd probably give him the money instead of losing our lives, but, in other ways, we have, in fact, chosen money over life. Some choose what career to pursue and what job offer to accept based not on life's dreams, but on what pays the most money. Some move from one place to another, not because it will be a better life for our families but simply because it will mean a pay increase.

Through faith, we understand that our culture has it wrong when it tells us that a good life is dependent on having money and things. Life is God's gift, as is the enjoyment of life. *"Everyone also to whom God has given wealth and possessions and power to enjoy them, and to accept his lot and rejoice in his toil—this is the gift of God"* (Ecclesiastes 5:19). In order to accept God's gift of happiness in our work and life, we need to understand that there are some things money can't buy.

One thing money can't buy is contentment. *"He who loves money will not be satisfied with money..."* (Ecclesiastes 5:10).

Something else money can't buy is friendship. Money can bring you lots of people who pretend to be your friends, but how many of them are more interested in your money than in you as a person?

A third thing money can't buy is peace of mind. Money-lovers are beset with worry.

The most important thing that money can't buy is life after death. All the money in the world can't prevent death from coming, and when it comes, you can't keep one penny of what you've piled up. Money can't buy eternal life with God, and it can't buy God's life within us right now.

The truth is that, if you have piles of money but don't have God, you have nothing. If you don't have money but do have God, you have everything. If you believe that money is the key to satisfying your desires,

then you will miss out on life, present and eternal. But if a joyful life with God is what you want, then don't be greedy for money. Be greedy for God. Pray that His life will live in you.

As you pack your shoeboxes this year, please keep in mind that the following **gifts are not allowed in the shoebox**: Candy (newly excluded in 2017); chocolate, and other food items; toothpaste (newly excluded for 2017); used or damaged items; war-related items such as toy guns, knives, or military figures; seeds; liquids or lotions; medications or vitamins; breakable items such as snow globes or glass containers; and aerosol cans. Some of the items are prohibited by Customs Laws and others are prohibited because they can break, melt, or otherwise spoil the contents of the box. War-related items are forbidden because many of the children have been traumatized by war and toothpaste is excluded because hungry children might eat it and toothpaste contains fluoride which can be poisonous if eaten in large amounts.

## 500<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Protestant Reformation Celebration

“The Protestant Reformation of the 16th century changed Christianity forever. Roused to action by the corruption and abuses they saw in the Roman Catholic Church of the time, visionary pastors and leaders like Martin Luther and John Calvin spearheaded a movement that transformed Christianity and eventually led to the emergence of the Protestant denominations that exist today.

The Reformers were guided by the conviction that the church of their day had drifted away from the essential, original teachings of Christianity, especially in regard to what it was teaching about salvation—how people can be forgiven of sin through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ and receive eternal life with God. The Reformation sought to re-orient Christianity on the original message of Jesus and the early church.

The Solas are Latin phrases (or slogans) that emerged during the Reformation to summarize the Reformers’ theological convictions about the essentials of Christianity. In most of the earliest articulations of the solas, three were typically specified: scripture over tradition, faith over works, and grace over merit, each intended to represent an important distinction compared with Catholic doctrine.

The Three Solas are:

**Sola Scriptura** (“Scripture alone”): The Bible alone is our highest authority.

**Sola Fide** (“Faith alone”): We are saved through faith alone in Jesus Christ.

**Sola Gratia** (“Grace alone”): We are saved by the grace of God alone.

The solas were not systematically articulated together until the 20th century. But sola gratia and sola fide were used in conjunction by the Reformers themselves. For example, in 1554, Martin Luther’s contemporary and fellow theologian, Melancthon wrote, “only by grace do we justify and only by faith are we justified.” All of the solas show up in various writings by the Protestant Reformers, but they are not catalogued together by any.

However, in 1916, Lutheran scholar Theodore Engelder published an article titled “The Three Principles of the Reformation: Sola Scriptura, Sola Gratia, Sola Fides” (“only scripture, only grace, only faith”)

Sola Scriptura, or “scripture alone” (literally: “by scripture alone”), asserts that scripture must govern over church traditions and interpretations which are themselves held to be subject to scripture. All church traditions, creeds, and teachings must be in unity with

the teachings of scripture as the divinely inspired Word of God.

Sola Scriptura asserts that the Bible can and is to be interpreted through itself, with one area of Scripture being useful for interpreting others. “All Scripture is God breathed...” 2 Timothy 3:16. That scripture can interpret itself is a means by which to show the unity of Scripture as a whole. As all doctrines are formed via scriptural understandings, all doctrines must be found to align with Scripture and as such are then subject to scripture before the believer can begin to apply them.

This particular sola is sometimes called the formal principle of the Reformation, since it is the source and norm of the material cause or principle, the gospel of Jesus Christ that is received sola fide (“through faith alone”) sola gratia (by God’s favor or “grace alone”). The adjective (sola) and the noun (scriptura) are in the ablative case rather than in the nominative case to indicate that the Bible does not stand alone apart from God, but rather that it is the instrument of God by which he reveals himself for salvation through faith in Christ.

### SOLA SCRIPTURA

The Scriptures are our ultimate and trustworthy authority for faith and practice. This doesn’t mean that the Bible is the only place where truth is found, but it does mean that everything else we learn about God and his world, and all other authorities, should be interpreted in light of Scripture. The Bible gives us everything we need for our theology. Every word of the Bible is inspired by God’s Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit also helps us to understand and obey Scripture.

### SOLA FIDE AND SOLA GRATIA

We are saved solely through faith in Jesus Christ because of God’s grace and Christ’s merit alone. We are not saved by our merits or declared righteous by our good works. God grants salvation not because of the good things we do, and despite our sin.

As humans, we inherited (from our ancestor Adam) a nature that is enslaved to sin. Because of our nature, we are naturally enemies of God and lovers of evil. We need to be made alive (regenerated) so that we can even have faith in Christ. God graciously chooses to give us new hearts so that we trust in Christ and are saved through faith alone. God graciously preserves us and keeps us. When we are faithless toward him, he is still faithful.

We can only stand before God by his grace as he mercifully attributes to us the righteousness of Jesus Christ and attributes to Jesus the consequences of our

Sola fide and sola gratia express the teaching of Ephesians 2:8: “For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them.”

This month as you put money into your mite container, say a prayer for Men from Michigan studying for the pastoral ministry in our seminaries.

In Romans 10:14-15 it says, *“How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in. And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can they preach unless they are sent? As it is written, ‘How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news.’”*

The number of pastoral vacancies continues to increase due to the blessed addition of new congregations, coupled with the retirement of clergy, and escalated by the number of second career pastors reaching retirement age earlier into their ministry. Also Men simply leave the ministry for various reasons.

Tuition, books, and housing costs continue to increase which causes financial burden on both new and returning pastoral students.

Men studying to become pastors need extra support and encouragement to continue in their studies.

The Michigan District LWML, meeting at Boyne Falls, MI, in July 2016, granted \$25,000 to assist men from Michigan with their tuition costs at either of our Synodical Seminaries as they study to become pastors.
